PULMONARY FUNCTION – POSSIBILITY OF INFLUENCE FOR IN-HOSPITAL ACUTE STROKE PATIENTS

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Key words: early physical therapy, acute stroke, breathing exercises

Introduction: Some studies have investigating respiratory training with stroke conditions. Randomized controlled trials of inspiratory training with feedback device were conducted in subacute and chronic stroke patients.

Methodology: The purpose of the study is to determine the possibility of impact on pulmonary function using feedback tool for respiratory rehabilitation during the acute period in patients with ischemic cerebral stroke. 18 patients in acute period, not later than 48 hours after the accident with light to moderate stroke severity according NIHSS scale. The applied study methods are: spirometry, inspiratory capacity (IC) with incentive spirometer device, Trunk Control Test (TCT).

Results: Better results in FVC, PEF, IC and TCT have been observed.

Discussion: Positive results on FVC and PEF probably due to the effect of training and motor control improvement of respiratory muscles. The improvement in IC affects the ventilation in patients in acute period. At discharge there was no patient unable to maintain balance while sitting, which is probably due to the application of physical therapy to influence the abdominal muscles.

Conclusion: Incentive inspiratory breathing device positively influence the dynamic pulmonary function in-hospital stroke patients.

MORPHOLOGICAL CHARACTERISTICS OF SHORT TRACK COMPETITORS

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Keywords: Morphology, somatotype, short track

The aim of the research was to investigate the morphological features of short track competitors as the good sports presentation depends on wide variety of factors and part of them is a proper morphological structure and body composition of the athletes from the corresponding of sport. The interconnection between the structure of the body and its functional abilities plays a significant role in the training process for obtaining the best sports results.

Anthropometric investigation of a representative sample of short track competitors was done. It included five lengths of the body, ten circumferences, seven diameters, fourteen skinfolds and body weight. Composed parameters characterizing body composition were calculated - % body fat, absolute quantity of fat tissue (kg) lean body mass (kg), absolute quantity of muscle mass (kg), muscular circumferences of arm and tight (cm), BMI. The somatotype of the athletes was defined by the Heath-Carter method. The data were compared with those of athletes from similar sports.

The results show that short track competitors have relatively low body fat tissue (about 12% for male and 17% for female athletes), well developed muscular-skeletal system, especially low extremities muscles and well developed chest. Their appearance is highlighted athletic and their average somatotype is endomorphic mesomorph.

POSTURAL CONTROL AND BALANCE REACTIONS IN PATIENTS WITH ISCHEMIC STROKE IN THE CHRONIC PERIOD

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Keywords: Static balance, Functional balance, Kinesitherapy, Ischemic stroke, Chronic period
The aim of this study is to follow the influence of specialized kinesitherapeutic methodology (SKTM) on static and functional equilibrium reactions in patients with ischemic stroke in the chronic period.

Material and methods: In the study were included 11 patients with chronic right-sided (63.6%) and left-sided (36.4%) hemiparesis after ischemic stroke within 3 months. Investigated persons are measured on the test performance of Berg (Berg Balance Scale-BBS) at the beginning of the 10th day, 1st month and 3th month.

Patients after 10-day daily physical therapy continued with an adapted program for home rehabilitation and requirements for it.

Results: After the analysis of the difference between the average values of the static and functional balance is established that, in the initial period there is greater improvement in the functional balance of 0.08 with a significance level of 0.05. In the period from day 10 to the 1st of the month, and the 1st to the 3rd month has a greater improvement in the static balance of 0.12 and with a significance level of 0.05.

Discussion: The applied by us methodology continued later as an exercise program at home, has a tendency to improve postural control and balance reactions in patients with ischemic stroke in the chronic period.

INJURY INCIDENCE AMONG NON-PROFESSIONAL BULGARIAN FOLK DANCERS

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Key words: Bulgarian folk dances, injury

Aim of the study: to determine the type, location and dissemination of the injuries among the dancers who practice Bulgarian folk dances (BFD).

Materials and methods: The studied group consisted of 154 dancers of both genders, aged between 18 and 45 years, practicing in 7 different dance clubs. The criteria for inclusion are: practicing BFD for 3 years and more, with two workouts weekly for 1 hour each. The method of the study is inquiry with questions about presence, location, mechanism and severity of the injuries.

Results and analysis: 34% of the participants reported some trauma related with the BFD. The most often injured area is the ankle (18,2%), followed by the knee (12,3%). There is a prevalence of the overuse injuries (55%). Most frequent are tendon injuries (24,6%) and muscle injuries (20,8%). In 53% of the cases the injury is classified as “light”, while the other answers are divided between “middle”, “moderate” and “severe”. These results are explained by the specific movement elements of the BFD – series of jumps, vaults, quicksteps, etc.

Conclusions: About 1/3 of the inquired have sustained trauma related with the practicing of BFD. There is a prevalence of the tendons and muscular injuries in the area of the ankle and knee joint. Further studies are needed to determine risk factors for sustaining an injury among recreational BFD practitioners and also building of effective preventional programs.
